#### Lecture: "The Rise of Cultural Entrepreneurs in Early Twentieth-Century China"

How did the business of culture in China change in the modern age? What new modes of cultural production became available thanks to evolving technologies and growing transregional ties? How did investors respond to the expansion of the cultural sphere? And how did artists respond to new money-making opportunities? This talk traces the historical forces that gave rise to a generation of Chinese *cultural entrepreneurs* (businesspeople who risked financial well-being and reputation by investing in multiple cultural enterprises) in the early twentieth century.


# T**ế**t New Year: A Celebration of Spring
